Army Officer



ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE (RMC) ENTRANTS. To enter as a General Service Officer (GSO) - direct entrant, you must be at least 17 years of age and have passes in Year 12 English and three other subjects. You can also be a tertiary student or a graduate from a tertiary institution.
AUSTRALIAN DEFENCE FORCE ACADEMY (ADFA) ENTRANTS. You can become a GSO through ADFA. To do this you must be at least 17 years of age and have completed Year 12 with results that allow admission to the University of NSW.

All officers complete training at the Royal Military College (RMC) Duntroon. Direct entrants complete an 18 month GSO course, covering leadership, management and military skills.

Entering through ADFA, you first must complete a degree in Engineering, Arts, Science, Technology, Business or IT. During this course, you commence your basic military training. You then complete 12 months at RMC to complete your GSO course.

After this, you complete Corps specific training.

Graduating from RMC, not only will you have completed the best leadership and management training in Australia, you will be awarded an Associate Diploma in Personnel Administration. ADFA graduates also receive their degree in their chosen field from the University of NSW. Following training, you commence your leadership role with an impressive starting salary package including superannuation and service allowance. You also get free healthcare and subsidised accommodation.

Army Officer Graduate entry



Graduates generally enter the Army as Specialist Service Officers (SSO). To do this you must have a professional or technical qualification in any one of a wide range of disciplines such as IT, Science, Medicine, Law or Engineering.

If you have completed an Undergraduate degree you could be eligible for sponsorship to study Medicine or Dentistry under the Graduate Program and be employed as a medical officer or dental officer.

Graduates become SSO after completing two x 16 day modules of the First Appointment Course (FAC) at RMC, and then complete military specialist and Corps training at an Army training centre. This prepares you for your specialist role within the Army. Alternatively, you can pursue a leadership role in the Army that's unrelated to your qualification by completing an 18-month GSO course at RMC.

Not only does the Army provide opportunities to advance your chosen career by practising your profession in a unique environment, you'll also develop your leadership and management skills. You get a generous salary package including superannuation and service allowance. You also get free healthcare and subsidised accommodation.

Army Officer Sponsored Undergraduate Entry



If you are currently studying Health or Engineering at a recognised Australian University, you may be eligible for sponsorship. You need to be at least 17 years of age and have completed one year of your degree.

You get to complete your undergraduate degree at any university you choose. After graduation you'll be required to complete a six-week SSO FAC at RMC Duntroon and military specialist and Corps training at an Army training centre.

In addition to the benefits of being an officer in the Army, you'll also receive the following benefits while you continue to study at your current university: a salary, your remaining tuition fees paid, a rent and text book allowance, subsidised accommodation and free healthcare. On graduation from RMC you'll receive a generous salary package including superannuation and service allowance.

Soldier General Entry



If you're 17 years of age or older with passes in Year 10 English and Mathematics you can choose from a wide variety of Army jobs including Combat, Administration and Logistics.

First you'll attend the Recruit Course at the Army Recruit Training Centre (ARTC) at Kapooka, Wagga Wagga NSW. Here you will complete physical training, weapon handling and firing, first aid, drill and field craft. This is followed by initial employment training at an Army training centre.

You build your skills while you develop self-confidence, self-discipline, personal fitness and teamwork - skills and attributes important to any future career you may wish to pursue. You'll receive an attractive salary package including superannuation and service allowance and other benefits such as free healthcare and subsidised accommodation.

Soldier Technical Entry



TECHNICAL TRAINING ENTRY. If you're 17 years of age with passes in Year 10 English, Mathematics, Science and one other subject, you may be eligible for trade training or an apprenticeship.
QUALIFIED ENTRY. If you already have a technical qualification or trade, and you meet the education requirements above, you may be eligible to be employed in your trade.

All Soldiers enlisting under technical entry attend the Recruit Course at the ARTC. Here you complete physical training, weapon handling and firing, first aid, drill and field craft. If you're not qualified, this is followed by technical or trade training at an Army trade training centre. If you're qualified, you only need to complete a short period of military specific trade training.

You'll get paid while you learn a trade at an Army technical or trade school. You'll come out with qualifications, job security, self discipline and self confidence. You'll have access to a very rewarding career path with a salary package including superannuation and service allowance after your initial employment training. You'll also receive free healthcare and subsidised accommodation.

Army Reserve



OFFICER. You'll need to be at least 17 years of age with passes in Year 12 English and three other subjects. A tertiary student or a graduate from a tertiary institution may also be eligible.
SOLDIER. You must be at least 17 years of age with passes in Year 10 English and Mathematics.

OFFICER. As a GSO you'll undertake your FAC in five modules. The first module is the Reserve Recruit Training Course at the ARTC. The next three are at Singleton, NSW and the final module is held at RMC. If you enter the Army Reserve as a SSO you complete two x 14 day modules of the SSO FAC at RMC.
SOLDIER. First you'll attend the four-week Reserve Recruit Training Course (RRTC) at the ARTC, NSW. Here you will complete physical training, weapon handling and firing, first aid, drill and field craft.

Being a professional reserve soldier or officer takes pride and commitment. Pride in always being your best and commitment to serve alongside confident, competent and highly motivated men and women providing a second line to the defence of our country.

Depending on specialisation and rank, you get a range of qualifications, experience and a generous tax free salary package including superannuation, and service allowance.
